Task

Your students will be given the following task.

You want to learn about the digital footprint, how it can affect your reputation online and offline, and how you can manage it.

To do so, you will work with a Wikipedia article about Digital Footprint. You will also analyse your social media posts or those of your favourite influencers and create and share with your colleagues an infographic about digital footprints on social media.

| Digital Citizenship | Ethical and responsible | Become aware of online behaviour; why digital footprint is important; the responsibilities that are related to digital footprints. |
| | Informed | Become aware of the drawbacks of social media use. |
| Meaning-making literacy | Media literacy | Learn how to present information visually. |

Main language activity

- Written reception: Reading Wikipedia articles.
- Oral reception: listening to videos about digital footprints.
- Written production: Creating an infographic.

Possible steps

- As a first step, learners can read the Wikipedia article in their target language(s). There is a possibility to study the topic with different languages in order to observe the differences or similarities in the texts.
- As a second step, learners can pick two random posts from their social media profile or an influencer's profile and reflect on how these posts may impact their digital footprint.
- Then, learners can brainstorm on the following question: How can you have a positive impact on your digital footprint? And they can make a list of things to post on social media in order to create a positive digital footprint.
- As a final step, learners can create an infographic about digital footprints based on their list and the article. They can work individually or in groups.







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Student Sheet

Task

You want to learn about the digital footprint, how it can affect your reputation online and offline, and how you can manage it?

To do so, you will work with a Wikipedia article about Digital Footprint. You will also analyse your social media posts or those of your favourite influencers and create and share with your colleagues an infographic about digital footprints on social media.

To complete the task

- Read a Wikipedia article about Digital Footprint in your target language. See for instance this article <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Digital_footprint</u>.
- You can also study the topic in different languages in order to see the differences or similarities in their presentations.
- Then you can pick two random posts from an influencer's social media profile or your own social media profile and reflect on how these posts may impact their digital footprint and their reputation.
- With other learners you can brainstorm the following question: How can you have a positive impact on your digital footprint? Make a list of things that you can do.
- You can adapt your list into an infographic to help your peers think critically about their digital footprints on social media.
- Your might want to include the following information:
 - What is a digital footprint?
 - Why is it important to manage your digital footprint?
 - How can you have a positive impact on your digital footprint?
